Material	Storage	Preferred Management / Disposal Practice	Hazardous Waste
PESTICIDES			
Liquids Powders	Original container	Use up when possible OR Hazardous Waste Facility (Metro)	Usually, many often toxic or hazardous due to petroleum product ingredients.
<p>Phase out any products with the following attributes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Products EPA Hazard Category 1 – DANGER label ▪ Restricted Use Pesticides ▪ Products with bioaccumulative toxics list for Oregon (see question #100) ▪ Products on other dangerous chemicals / human hazard lists: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Washington State Dangerous chemicals list - http://www.ecy.wa.gov/programs/hwtr/demodebris/pages2/dwpcodes.html ○ California Proposition 65 list or chemicals with reproductive concerns - http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/files/P65single010711.pdf 			
FLEET / EQUIPMENT			
Used Oil	Drum or above ground tank – labeled “Used Oil”	Used Oil Recycler	Possibly NO if recycled or reused for energy
Transmission Fluid	Drum – can go in “Used Oil” drum		
Gear Oil			
Break Fluid	Bottle or Tank	Used Oil Recycler	Possibly – could contain metals
Used Antifreeze	Segregated tank or drum	Separately recycle	Possibly NO if recycled
Old Gasoline	Any container with tight fitting lid.	Recycler or Hazardous Waste Facility (Metro)	No – but does have some hazardous components (benzene, toluene) within fuel.
Solvents, Thinners, Other Fluids	Segregated tank or drum	Fluids recycler	Possibly listed as hazardous waste
Paints, oil based	Original container	Hazardous Waste Facility (Metro)	Yes, if solvent based
